Conjunctions to extend sentences
when, if, because, although

Today we will recap using a conjunction to extend our sentences around
trains.

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Conjunctions are words that join sentences, clauses, or other singular words together. A conjunction is a type of connective (a term for any word that connects bits of text).

when, if, because, although, after, while ,
so, as, before

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Here are some examples of conjunctions used below:

- > "I don't like vegetables, although they're good for me."
- > "My brother is grumpy because he has to do his homework."
- > "Michelle is going to the movies after dinner."
- > "Let's go for a walk while it's still light outside."

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Here are some examples of conjunctions in train sentences:

- > I caught the train, although I will still be late.
- > The bullet train is the fastest train because it moves by magnets
- > We need to get the train after we finish our dinner.
- > We could watch the view while on the train journey.

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Here are some examples of conjunctions in train sentences with time fronted adverbials to further extend my sentences!

- At 7 o'clock, I caught the train, although I will still be late.
- At 9pm, we need to get the train after we finish our dinner.
- This afternoon, we could watch the view while on the train journey.
- At 6am, I will have to wake up because I have an important train to catch.
